### **About Global Surgical Frontiers (GSF)**

Global Surgical Frontiers (GSF) is the global health conference of the Royal College of Surgeons of England. Founded in 2012, GSF was the first conference of its kind to focus specifically on the role and importance of surgery in tackling global health challenges. The conference brings together the wider surgical and dental community, policy makers, non-governmental organisations, development agencies, trainees, students and academics to understand the challenges and share the evidence-based solutions for improving access to timely, safe and affordable surgical, dental, obstetric, anaesthesia and trauma care in resource-limited settings.

This year marks the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the publication of the seminal <u>Lancet Commission on Global Surgery</u> and the adoption of Resolution <u>WHA68.15</u> by the World Health Assembly (WHA) on "Strengthening Emergency and Essential Surgical Care and Anaesthesia as a Component of Universal Health Coverage."

The Lancet Commission provided robust evidence and advocacy for integrating surgery into the global health agenda and emphasising surgical care is an essential, indivisible component of any effective health system. Universal access to safe, high-quality surgical and anaesthesia care with financial protection remains paramount. The Commission articulated five key messages. It also proposed indicators and recommendations to improve access to affordable, safe surgical and anaesthesia care in low- and middle-income countries, providing a framework for developing national surgical plans and targets to be achieved by 2030.

Additionally, two years have passed since the WHA adopted Resolution WHA76.2, which underscored the significance of integrated emergency, critical, and operative care as fundamental to resilient health systems and preparedness for health emergencies. This resolution recognised the widespread gaps in emergency, critical and operative care capacity revealed during the COVID-19 pandemic and highlighted the need to strengthen humanitarian surgical capability in response to the increasing frequency of health crises caused by conflict, climate change, and natural disasters.

This milestone anniversary offers a timely opportunity to assess the advances achieved over the past decade, as well as the ongoing and emerging challenges in promoting equitable access to surgical care globally. The global health context is continually evolving and GSF 2025 serves as a crucial platform for a comprehensive evaluation of the outcomes, impact, policies, and innovations that define progress and challenge prevailing assumptions. The imperative for concerted advocacy at all levels, will inform the dialogue and chart a course for further collaborative action.

This conference will be of significant interest to professionals engaged in global health, surgical system strengthening, international development, and humanitarian surgery.
