Mr Chinmay Gupte is a Consultant Orthopaedic Surgeon and Clinical Reader (Associate Professor) in knee and trauma surgery at Imperial College London. He is also an ex professional cricketer. His main clinical interests are in adolescent and adult sports knee conditions, and in treating osteoarthritis of the knee.





member of the executive of the British Knee Society (BASK), the British Orthopaedic Association Research Committee, RCS England Research Committee and the Marylebone Cricket Club Board, and leads Undergraduate MBBS medical training in musculoskeletal conditions.

He was awarded a PhD from Imperial College in 2004 and won the prestigious British Orthopaedic Association Robert Jones Gold Medal Proxime Accessit in 2005. He has published over 90 papers in this and other topics.

He continues his research as a Clinical Reader in the Faculty of Medicine at Imperial College.

Mr Ravi Kunzru



Ravi Kunzru is Emeritus Consultant Orthopaedic Surgeon at Whipps Cross Hospital, London, and Medical Historian.

He is a senior member of various medical societies, and some History of Medicine societies, and was President of the History of Medicine Section, now the History of Medicine Society, of the Royal Society of Medicine. He has lectured on History of Surgery, and on History of Ayurveda at the Society of Apothecaries' courses on History of Medicine, and still lectures on the latter.

He has translated parts of the ancient Indian surgeon, Sushruta's Compendium from Sanskrit to English; validated by sanskritists. He and other specialist colleagues have collaborated to experimentally reproduce some of Sushruta's operations, and their surgical anatomy and pathology. These studies have been presented at various national and international meetings, and some have been published.

Speakers

Professor Neil Mortensen

Neil Mortensen is Professor of Colorectal Surgery in the University of Oxford Medical School and has been on the staff of the Oxford University Hospitals since 1987, where he is currently honorary consultant colorectal surgeon. He is a fellow of Green Templeton College.

He trained in Birmingham, Bristol and St Mark's Hospital, and has clinical and research interests in a wide range of colorectal diseases. In 1980 he was awarded a Paul Hawley International Guest Scholarship with the American College of Surgeons.

He became a member of the Council of the Royal College of Surgeons of England in 2013, and a member of the Trustee Board in 2016. In 2017 he was appointed Vice-President, and in 2020 he was appointed President.



Mr William Shand



William Shand is Honorary Consulting Surgeon at St Bartholomew's and the Royal London Hospitals. He was previously a consultant surgeon at St Bartholomew's Hackney and Homerton Hospitals.

William was Master of the Worshipful Company of Barbers of London from 2001 to 2002 and Master of the Worshipful Society of Apothecaries of London from 2004 to 2005.

Now retired, William's interests include watercolour painting and dry-fly fishing.

Professor Andrew Shorthouse

Andrew Shorthouse trained at St Mary's, graduating in 1971. His surgical training was at St George's and St Mark's. In 1986 he moved to Sheffield as a consultant general surgeon, sub-specialising in colorectal surgery.

He designed the armorial bearings and presidential chain of office of the ACPGBI and was subsequently elected president. He was president of the Section of Coloproctology, RSM, and then a founder member and president of the ESCP.

His watercolour miniatures have been exhibited at the Hilliard Society and the RMS.
